The advisory board met in January to embark on a 5 year strategic planning adventure, to see where we have been and where we'd like to go. And all of those discussions include YOU! The Lewis Manilow Common Ground Initiative is sparking new and exciting connections with the communities we serve and will lead to a Common Ground Summit in October of 2021. We are working with community leaders to identify individuals and organizations already doing the work that the initiative seeks to do around social equity. Our founder, Lew Manilow, recognized how art serves as one of our brain's organizing systems, and that one of the reasons it has survived and thrived for tens of thousands of years is that art raises our aspirations and helps us to imagine and achieve great goals. Join us to enrich the lives of those who live in the communities we serve by bringing Lew's vision to fruition.

I am inspired regularly by the art and artists of the park. Most recently I was able to attend "The Weight", a solo exhibition of Tony Tasset's new work at Kavi Gupta Gallery. Paul, one of the most celebrated works in our collection at the Nate, is a centerpiece of Tasset's career and is featured in a video about the exhibit. < https://youtu.be/wQX7lDb7tjl > Tasset's work is in direct response to current events making Paul just as relevant today as when it was created in 2006. The new work by Christine Tarkowski now on view in Millennium Park's Boeing Gallery, Chicago is in conversation with Working on the Failed Utopia, 2006, which stands outside the main entrance to GSU. Connected by the Metra Electric line, the artist's work contemplates our place in the universe, and resonates with contemporary issues. We were able to install permanent lighting inside Working on the Failed Utopia fulfilling the artist's vision since it's creation. The art and the artists of the Nate serve as a touchstone, grounding us in our culture, and leading us into the future.





guidelines and restrictions announced by GSU, it is canceled. Connect with the Visual Arts Gallery exhibition: "Sarah Krepp tatting < - - > tearing" online. Krepp uses salvaged tires to construct her paintings and sculptures, a material that signifies humankind's use and abuse of natural resources and the environment. Her work explores the tension between the shelter and safety of domestic life and the brute force of the road, particularly as it pertains to her own journey as an artist. If we are able to have the gallery open for browsing visitors, we will provide that update closer to the event.

The tour will focus on our two land art pieces in the collection: Field Rotation by Mary Miss, and Bodark Arc by Martin Puryear. Both pieces activate the imagination because while walking through them on the ground, they make us imagine what might be seen from above - the monumental works cannot be seen all at once, keeping their mysteries just beyond easy reach.



It is possible that visitors to the park have overlooked *Field Rotation* because it is not part of the popular east walking loop and parts of the work are sunken into the earth and therefore not visible from the road.



Field Rotation is an early work in Miss' career dating 1980-81, but displays her ongoing desire to work in transitional spaces i.e. where the water meets the land, the valley meets the mountain; and in this case where the city meets the prairie; her work is calling urbanites to discover nature.

Miss describes Field Rotation as intentionally set away from the hustle and bustle of campus and says "it includes 125 posts that have been cut to achieve a perfectly level plane that contrasts with the subtle contouring of the land in which they sit; they are four feet tall at one end, and sixteen feet tall at the other. The difference in height reveals the sloping topography of the field that would otherwise be barely noticeable. At the center of the pinwheeling posts sits an irregularly shaped sunken court below with ladders for entry. Within this interior space are platform walkways and a twelve-foot-deep central well with a protruding ladder. The well allows the descent to continue visually or physically; the level of water in it reflects the amount of rain that has fallen recently. The experiences available by moving through the structure and its surroundings are more important than what the structure is in itself". Field Rotation encourages viewers to step away from busy activity and act on curiosity.

Miss continues to work in New York City on projects that acknowledge how vital nature experiences are for city living, and demonstrate how beneficial artists can be in city planning.

Join us for the Earth Day walk on April 18th and explore Field Rotation.

CONSERVATION



Yes! For Lady Day by Mark di Suvero is getting a paint job! The brutal Illinois weather takes its toll on outdoor sculpture, so we are always working to keep the collection looking its best. With the help of generous donors, we are able to do some repair work, rust mitigation, and apply a fresh coat of paint to the piece that got the whole project started back in 1968. We are excited to be working with a local small business to do the work, so watch for updates in the months to come.



The path that defines Martin Puryear's *Bodark Arc* is overgrown with grass – we hope to have it cleared back to a distinct walkway this summer. This environmental land art piece is the largest work in the collection, and yet the artist designed it to disappear into the landscape only to be discovered and reveal itself slowly as visitors move through it. A favorite in the collection, Bodark Arc will be featured in our upcoming Earth Day Walk on April 18th.


