## Research Activities

GUIDE Project Interns are assigned a mentor based on shared interest and career aspirations. Mentor will design and implement a research project supported by a UICC researcher or research team. As an Intern, your responsibilities may include:

- Attending workshops or conferences related to latest research
- Contributing to project team meetings
- Conducting literature reviews
- Recruiting or enrolling research participants
- Collecting, maintaining and/or analyzing data
- Develop and present research paper, poster, and oral presentation with guidance
- Attend weekly writing workshop and journal club
- Participate in volunteer and other community outreach experiences
- Instituting health programs related to education, outreach and intervention

## Application Process

Consideration for an internship opportunity through the GUIDE Project requires an application process:

- A complete application form on file
- Provide copy of current resume and cover letter
- Provide copy of unofficial college transcripts
- Personal statement describing specific interest in cancer disparities
- Provide 2 official letters of recommendation (one must be from a faculty member)
- Statement of current career trajectory
- Be able to make an eight week commitment over the summer
