Comprehensive Curriculum

In the BSW program, you will learn about social work ethics, perspectives and frameworks e.g. person in environment, social justice, strengths, empowerment, advocacy and anti racism, etc. and how to apply them when assessing and intervening with a myriad of bio/psycho/social issues. You'll learn about the various settings that social workers are employed and the roles they assume at a generalist level. Our BSW program prepares you to practice on all levels of practice (Micro/Messo/Macro) with all ages across the life span. We promote professional development through critical self reflection, experiential learning and a 420 hour internship in your senior year. You'll gain the insight you need to work with children, families and individuals who may be facing the most critical crises in their lives.

We also offer several electives in various areas of social work practice e.g. child welfare, forensic social work, trauma, aging, management & supervision, healthcare, etc.

If you are interested in Child Welfare, we offer a Licensed Child Welfare Practice Subspecialty (Illinois Child Welfare Employee License/CWEL: SOCW 4000). BSW majors interested in this subspecialty must include these courses in their study plan, which is developed in consultation with the faculty advisor.

Special Admission Requirements

In addition to meeting university admissions criteria, applicants must:

- Have obtained a minimum of 2.25 G.P.A. for the last 60 hours;
- Submit two completed recommendation forms, at least one of which must be from a current or former college instructor.
 Recommendation forms are available in the Admissions Office and on the website at

- Interview with BSW faculty; and following the interview,
- Write and submit a personal statement in accordance with a prescribed format which will be provided at the interview.

Degree Requirements

Students must meet all university requirements for a bachelor's degree. In addition, students must:

- Take at least two courses a term. Special circumstances require program approval;
- Maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or higher; and earn a grade of "C" or better in all courses;
- All undergraduate social work courses for which a student receives a grade lower than a "C" may be repeated a maximum of two times.

Child Welfare Selectives
