Morning sessions (10 a.m.-noon)

World History: The European Renaissance Class Leaders: *Myras and Linda Osman*

Referring to the Renaissance papacy, William Manchester in *A World Lit Only By Fire* said, "At any given moment the most dangerous enemy in Europe was the reigning pope." In reviewing the Renaissance papacy, we will examine the evidence that Manchester provides to back up his claim. We will cover the political turmoil at the Italian city-states and Machiavelli's famous work on politics, *The Prince*. Other topics to be explored include the power and influence of the great families of the era (the Medici, Sforza, de Este and others), Humanism and the rise of literacy and education, the art and artists of the early and high Renaissance, the Christian Humanists of the Northern Renaissance, and the art and artists of the Northern Renaissance.

Executive Power and the Supreme Court: Leading Cases from Thomas Jefferson to Barack Obama Class Leader: *Carl Stover*

This course will examine conflicts with other branches of government, the rights of the individuals, foreign affairs, war, and domestic powers. Participants will read versions of Supreme Court cases edited down to approximately five pages each, generally three per week, and occasionally other material. Previous experience with reading law is not required.
