	5. Once the spring semester ended; we set up a 4 bedroom apartment and semi-suite as model spaces for summer 2017; initially a semi-suite space made was converted into a model tour
	space in February 2017 when spring occupancy permitted us to take a semi-suite off line.
Analysis of Results	The office of Auxiliary Services & University Housing has actively participated and supported all marketing and outreach programs that are designed to recruit prospective students to GSU. In
	addition to these programs/events, emails are sent in the fall semester and in the spring/summer to all newly admitted students providing them information about on campus
	housing and encouraging them to submit their housing application in a timely manner.
	Housing staff have also worked to retain students living on campus by actively communicating with those who have debt holds or immunization holds and making sure that the impacted
	students understand what they need to do in order to be able to remain an enrolled student and eligible to live in Prairie Place.
	As of June 1, 2017 we had received 64 completed applications from new students. An additional 23 students had started application but not paid. Thirty-seven FA17 freshman had submitted complete applications; an additional 11 had not yet paid. We had 17 new applications from transfer students: 11 paid and 6 not yet paid. These numbers are significantly behind where we were at the same time in the summer of 2016.

When Housing realized this a meeting was set up with International Services staff to discuss the importance of Housing being included in future orientation programs. In addition, University Housing staff met with all international INDUS students to discuss bed bugs and common kitchen usage and etiquette. All new international students who resided in the area previously met with either the RHD or Asst. Director prior to moving in to the building to circumvent any potential bed bug/living issues.</li> <li>The Residence Director of Prairie Place let International Services know about programs being held in Prairie Place so that they could encourage international students living in Prairie Place to attend. This communication did not increase participation by international students in the programs/events held in Prairie Place.</li> </ol>

	were able to provide 39 wait list students with fall housing. No waitlist was necessary for spring 2017 semester.

	4. The lack of a state budget has caused expansion conversations to be put on hold;					
Analysis of Results	We have developed a routine tracking report that allows us to compare applications received					
	from one year to the next. We are also able to track/compare census day occupancy for each semester.					
	The entire waitlist was exhausted in the fall semester. There were 39 waitlist students					
	assigned to spaces during the fall recorded on the census day. As of fall census we were at					
	99.65% occupancy. Our spring occupancy was 89.93% at spring census. This was also the					
	highest spring occupancy in the 3 years of Prairie Place.					
	The State budget situation has severely impacted our plan to expand the on campus housing					
	program. At this point in time there is no plan to move forward anytime soon with constructing building 2.
