### Abstract

The ROSC Council Needs Assessment is a collaborative undertaking by Bridgeway, Inc. to highlight the needs of services in Knox, Warren, Henry and Henderson Counties as it pertains to mental health, substance use disorders and recovery.

### **ROSC Needs Assessment**

#### **Bridgeway, Inc.**

#### **ROSC Definition**

A ROSC is a coordinated network of community-based services and supports that is person-centered and builds on the strengths and resilience of individuals, families, and communities to achieve abstinence and improved health, wellness, and quality of life for those with or at risk of alcohol and drug problems.

#### **Mission Statement**

“Collaborating to build and empower communities of recovery.”

There is a lack of understanding in the counties we serve that “recovery happens within the community.” The development of a collaborating Recovery Oriented System of Care will work to create a culture that builds and nurtures recovery.

#### **Project Description**

The Recovery Oriented Systems of Care (ROSC) Councils will assist communities with building local recovery oriented systems of care and that can network with the statewide ROSC Council. Bridgeway serves as the lead agency collaborating with community members to form the local ROSC Council. To ensure the sustainability of the ROSC Councils, this lead agency must demonstrate a commitment to establish the ROSC Council permanently with a long-term (5 year) strategic plan, either as a stand-alone non-profit organization or with a permanent business relationship with a lead agency. This agreement is set forth by terms and conditions applicable to services funded by the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS), Division of Substance Use Prevention and Recovery (SUPR) for the development of Recovery Oriented Systems of Care Council.

#### **Project Expectations**

Identify and address the needs of the recovery community and promote infrastructure development of Recovery Community Organizations (RCOs) through training and education on issues such as operations, billing systems, recruitment, sustainability and integration into larger systems.

Involve people with lived experience. Lived Experience means personal knowledge about substance use disorders (SUDs), including co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (CODs) treatment, and recovery gained through direct involvement, which may include that individual's involvement as a patient, family member or loved one of a person receiving SUD/COD treatment services.

Create an integration of systems within the ROSC, local hospitals, primary care, mental health, law enforcement, local business owners, local government representatives and policy makers, persons with lived experience and SUD intervention, treatment, prevention and recovery support service providers.

Build a menu of services and supports including all the components listed in the definition above: person-centered, building on strengths/resiliencies, coordinated, and community based.

Organize the logistics of ROSC Council meetings, stipends to ensure the participation of persons with lived experience, training cost, or website administration costs. Plans that include the development of Recovery Community Organizations (RCOs) in the ROSC are strongly encouraged.

Build capacity for communities to provide advocacy, education and recovery support services for people in recovery from SUDs and co-occurring (SUD/Mental Health) Disorders (COD).

Map resources and assess needs including: readiness for a recovery community organization.

Inform, educate and empower individuals and communities, expanding access to a comprehensive array of prevention, treatment and peer recovery support service options.

## **Information by County**

### **Chapter 1. County Demographics**

#### **Knox County**

As of the 2010 United States Census, there were 52,919 people, 21,535 households, and 13,324 families residing in the county. The population density was 73.9 inhabitants per square mile (28.5/km<sup>2</sup>). There were 24,077 housing units at an average density of 33.6 per square mile (13.0/km<sup>2</sup>). The racial makeup of the county was 87.5% white, 7.2% black or African American, 0.6% Asian, 0.2% American Indian, 1.9% from other races, and 2.5% from two or more races. Those of Hispanic or Latino origin made up 4.8% of the population. In terms of ancestry, 23.1%

were German, 14.9% were Irish, 11.7% were English, 11.6% were Swedish, and 8.0% were American.

Of the 21,535 households, 27.2% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 45.7% were married couples living together, 11.9% had a female householder with no husband present, 38.1% were non-families, and 32.3% of all households were made up of individuals. The average household size was 2.27 and the average family size was 2.84. The median age was 42.0 years.

The median income for a household in the county was \$39,545 and the median income for a family was \$51,740. Males had a median income of \$42,067 versus \$25,380 for females. The per capita income for the county was \$20,908. About 10.9% of families and 15.5% of the population were below the poverty line, including 24.7% of those under age 18 and 7.3% of those age 65 or over.

### **Warren County**

At the 2010 United States Census, there were 17,707 people, 6,918 households and 4,617 families residing in the county. The population density was 32.6 inhabitants per square mile (12.6/km<sup>2</sup>). There were 7,682 housing units at an average density of 14.2 per square mile (5.5/km<sup>2</sup>). The racial makeup of the county was 91.3% white, 1.7% black or African American, 0.5% Asian, 0.2% American Indian, 0.1% Pacific Islander, 4.5% from other races, and 1.6% from two or more races. Those of Hispanic or Latino origin made up 8.4% of the population.[11] In terms of ancestry, 25.2% were German, 14.7% were Irish, 11.3% were English, 10.0% were Swedish, and 5.5% were American.

Of the 6,918 households, 29.6% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 52.2% were married couples living together, 9.7% had a female householder with no husband present, 33.3% were non-families, and 28.2% of all households were made up of individuals. The average household size was 2.40 and the average family size was 2.91. The median age was 39.6 years.

The median household income was \$41,636 and the median family income was \$49,623. Males had a median income of \$40,289 and females \$25,460. The per capita income was \$20,047. About 11.0% of families and 13.4% of the population were below the poverty line, including 18.1% of those under age 18 and 10.6% of those age 65 or over.

### **Henry County**

As of the 2010 United States Census, there were 50,486 people, 20,373 households, and 14,149 families residing in the county. The population density was 61.3 inhabitants per square mile

(23.7/km<sup>2</sup>). There were 22,161 housing units at an average density of 26.9 per square mile (10.4/km<sup>2</sup>). The racial makeup of the county was 94.8% white, 1.6% black or African American, 0.4% Asian, 0.2% American Indian, 1.6% from other races, and 1.4% from two or more races. Those of Hispanic or Latino origin made up 4.8% of the population. In terms of ancestry, 30.0% were German, 14.6% were Irish, 12.3% were Swedish, 11.5% were English, and 7.2% were American.

Of the 20,373 households, 31.1% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 55.9% were married couples living together, 9.5% had a female householder with no husband present, 30.6% were non-families, and 26.1% of all households were made up of individuals. The average household size was 2.44 and the average family size was 2.92. The median age was 41.8 years.

The median income for a household in the county was \$49,164 and the median income for a family was \$61,467. Males had a median income of \$44,589 versus \$30,992 for females. The per capita income for the county was \$24,915. About 6.8% of families and 10.4% of the population were below the poverty line, including 16.9% of those under age 18 and 8.7% of those age 65 or over.

#### Henderson County

As of the 2010 United States Census, there were 7,331 people, 3,149 households, and 2,127 families residing in the county. The population density was 19.3 inhabitants per square mile (7.5/km<sup>2</sup>). There were 3,827 housing units at an average density of 10.1 per square mile (3.9/km<sup>2</sup>). The racial makeup of the county was 98.2% white, 0.2% Asian, 0.2% American Indian, 0.2% black or African American, 0.1% Pacific Islander, 0.2% from other races, and 1.0% from two or more races. Those of Hispanic or Latino origin made up 1.1% of the population. In terms of ancestry, 24.4% were German, 14.5% were Irish, 11.9% were English, 5.9% were Swedish, and 5.0% were American.

Of the 3,149 households, 26.9% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 54.9% were married couples living together, 8.7% had a female householder with no husband present, 32.5% were non-families, and 27.3% of all households were made up of individuals. The average household size was 2.31 and the average family size was 2.78. The median age was 47.2 years.

The median income for a household in the county was \$43,450 and the median income for a family was \$55,154. Males had a median income of \$41,052 versus \$27,426 for females. The per capita income for the county was \$22,492. About 7.8% of families and 11.4% of the population were below the poverty line, including 13.3% of those under age 18 and 8.3% of those age 65 or over.

### Eagle View Community Health Systems, Inc.

Eagle View is designated as a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC), a community based health care organization that provides comprehensive primary and preventive care services to persons of all ages, regardless of their ability to pay.

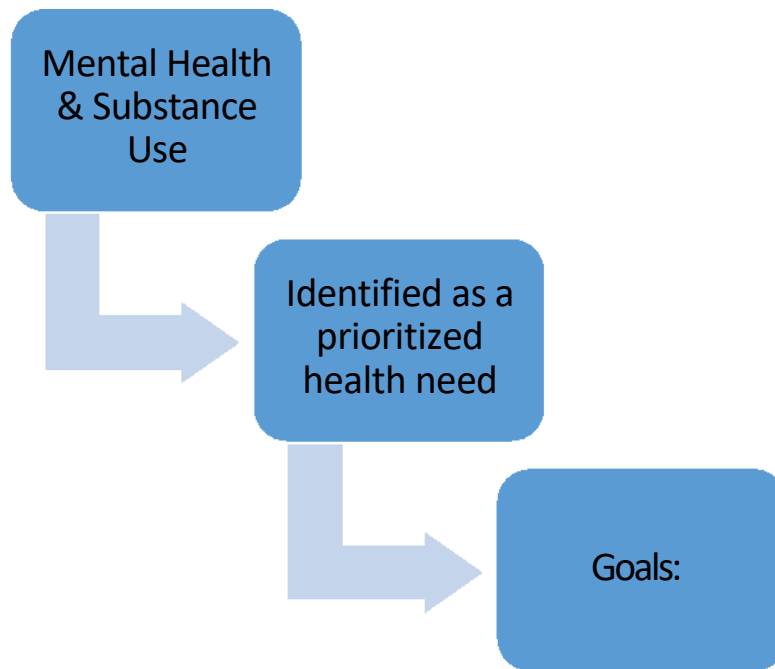
Eagle View's medical services include: Primary Medical Care, Acute Illness Visits, Chronic Illness Visits, School & Sports Physicals, DOT Physicals, Immunizations and Wellness Visits.

Eagle View has a Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW). The Licensed Clinical Social Worker completes behavioral health assessments for children, adolescents and adults who may be experiencing difficulty with depression, anxiety, and dysthymia. She also conducts screenings for substance misuse. Counseling services are offered on Wednesdays and Thursdays at the Eagle View Clinic in Oquawka. The services may be low cost or free.

### Family Outreach Community Center

The Family Outreach Community Center exists to improve the quality of life for residents of Henderson County, Illinois by providing assistance for families in need, implementing programs targeted towards strengthening the community, and assisting other existing outreach programs in the county. We believe in a Christian focus to providing services.

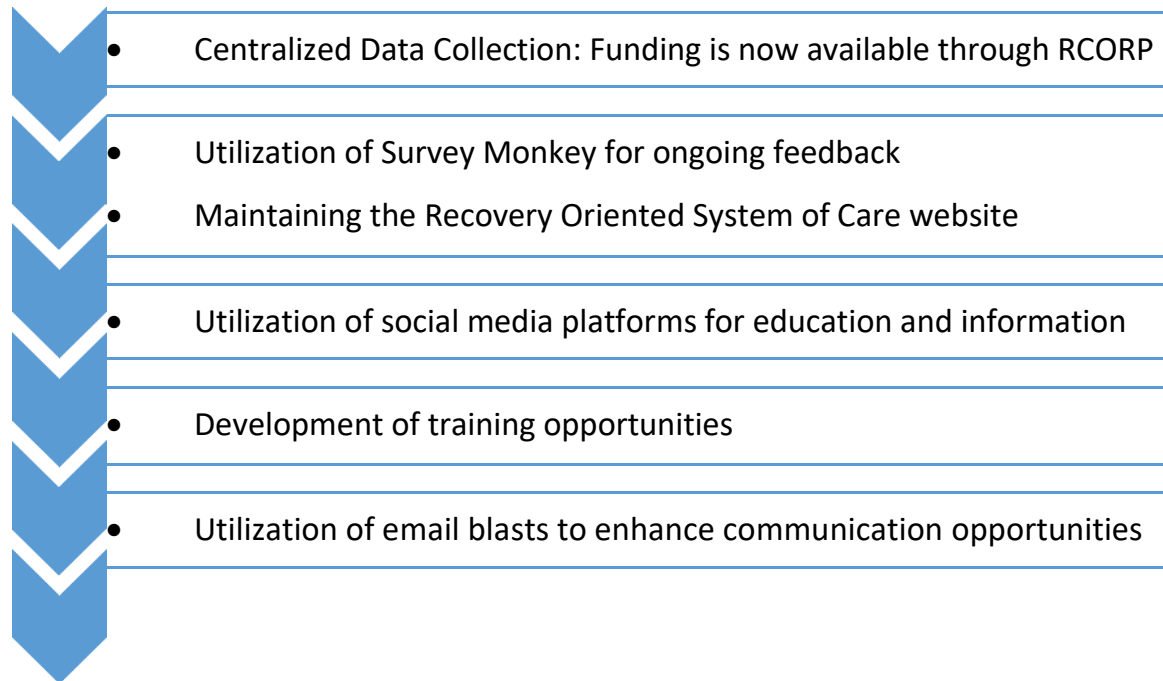

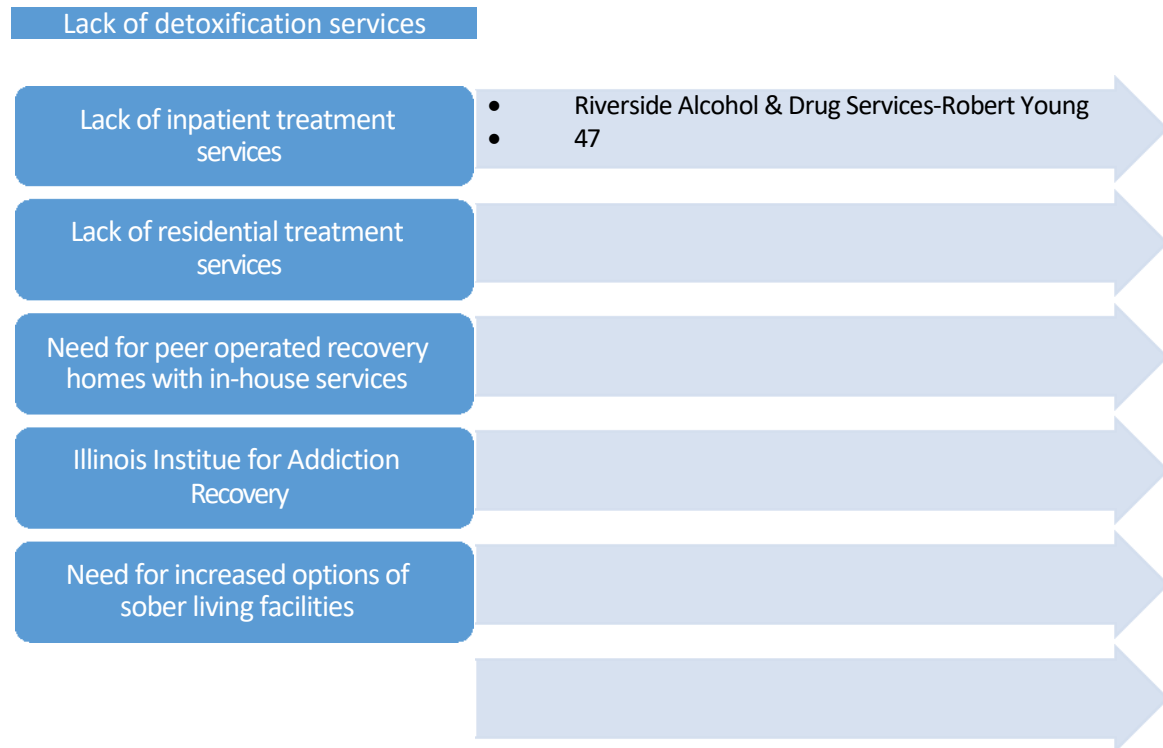

### I. Licensed Providers

#### a) Bridgeway, Inc.

Bridgeway's substance use services are committed to the overall agency mission of providing an array of diversified, measurable, high-quality services to individuals and families in need. These services are designed to assist and empower people in maximizing their potential; for personal development and growth in all areas of functioning by preventing, reducing and/or eliminated alcohol and drug abuse issues.

Intervention and substance use services are offered in a five county area (Knox, Henry, Warren, Henderson and McDonough) in West Central Illinois.

**b) Good Shepherd Foundation**

Evaluations

Good Shepherd Foundation offers both Court Evaluations (Adult, Adolescent) and DUI Evaluations in accordance with the Illinois Division of Alcohol and Substance Abuse (DASA) and the Illinois Secretary of State.

Driver's Risk Education

A 10 hour education program completed in four consecutive 2 1/2 hour classes. Fulfills Illinois Secretary of State requirement.

Adult Level 0.5 Moderate Risk Education

12 hours of Outpatient Treatment delivered in six-2 hour classes, twice weekly. Successful completion is contingent upon maintaining abstinence from drug and alcohol use for the duration of treatment, participation, attendance and completion of treatment plan goals. Abstinence is monitored through random drug screening.

#### Adult Level I Outpatient Significant Risk

20 hours of Outpatient Treatment delivered in ten-2 hour classes, twice weekly. Successful completion is contingent upon maintaining abstinence from drug and alcohol use for the duration of treatment, participation, attendance and completion of treatment plan goals. Abstinence is monitored through random drug screening.

#### Adult Level II Outpatient

75 hours of Intensive outpatient treatment delivered in 3 hour groups 3 times per week. Typically lasts 8-10 weeks. Successful completion is contingent upon maintaining alcohol/drug abstinence, participation, attendance, completion of treatment plan goals and weekly attendance in AA/NA. Abstinence is monitored through random drug screening. Beginning to build sober support in the community is required. Followed by a period of continuing care delivered via 1 hour group weekly for a total of 75 hours.

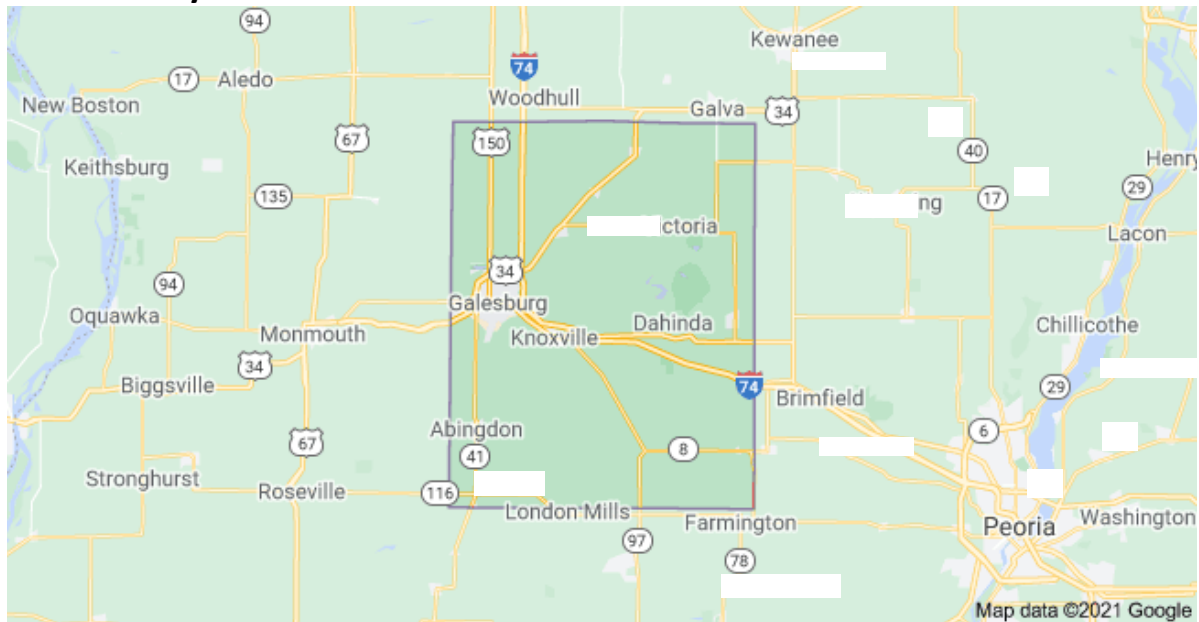

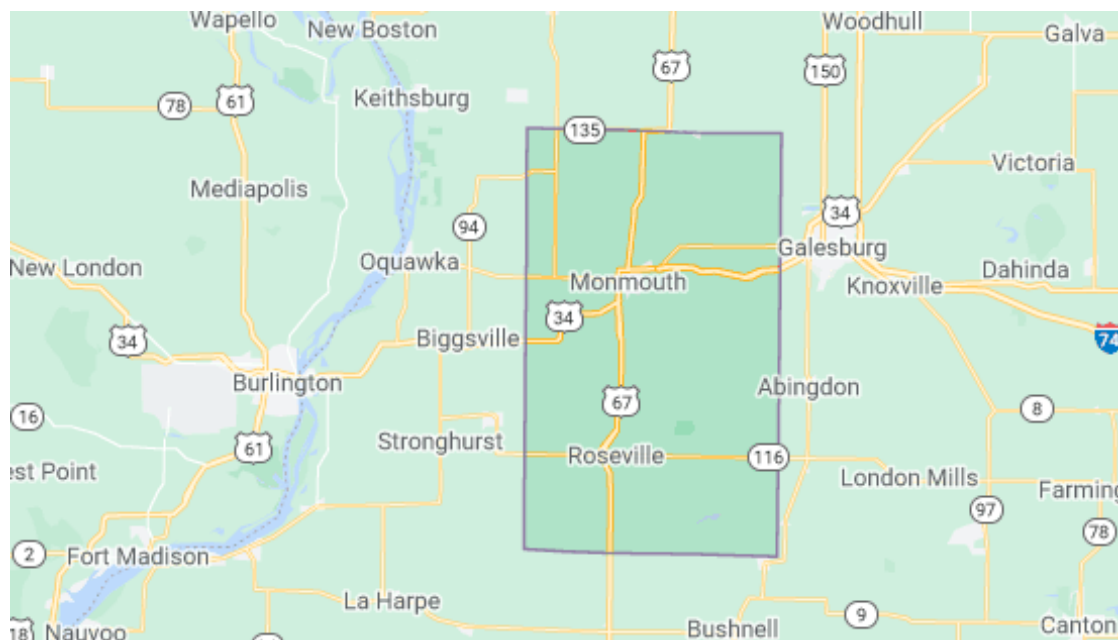

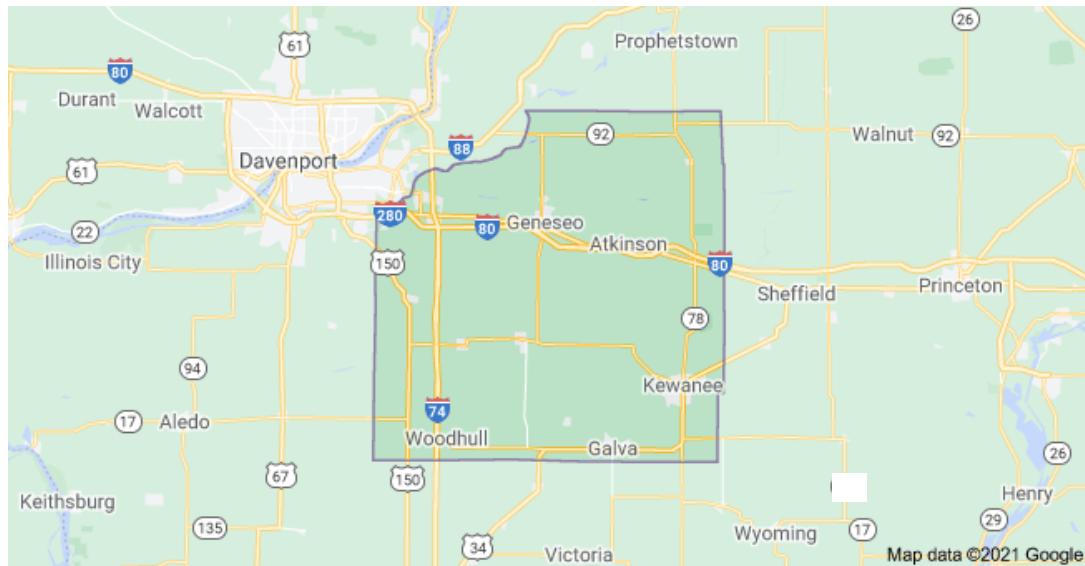
