Agenda Topic 3 – Prol	pation and Drug Court
Time allotted: 40 Minutes	Corinne Briscoe and Susan Dunn
Presentation and Discussion	 Corinne Briscoe is the coordinator of drug court for Macoupin, Greene, and Scott counties. Program highlights: Drug court is a unique part of CJ system that incorporates 3 entities: the judiciary (judges, public defenders, state attorneys, and prosecutors), with probation which is community supervision, and treatment. It is an evidence-based program following national and state standard. 102 of counties in Illinois have drug courts. Montgomery, Macoupin, and Greene all have drug court. Scott does not but leans on neighboring counties. The first step in the process is a screening and introduction to the program. The program is a big undertaking because it has daily requirements. Drug court is not like probation. It usually lasts 24 months but could be shorter or longer based on the individual.

- The team is based on judge, states attorney, public defender, probation officer, coordinator, representatives from treatment center, community members, and law enforcement.
- The team decides if an individual has done well or not over last two weeks based on their behavior and the rules they are required to comply with.
- If they comply, they get a reward which is typically a draw with different rewards (gift cards, candy, deodorant, etc.), a clap, and positive reinforcement from the judge.
- If they do not comply, they get a sanction which is meant to change the behavior that was seen as negative - could mean an extra meeting, loss of rights, home confinement, etc. Team gives judge recommendations but its ultimately the judge's decision.
- Program has 4 phases with the first having the toughest requirements.
- Other requirements include drug testing (typically 3x a week), meet with probation officer weekly, comply with any treatment requirements (could be outpatient or residential for substance use/mental health).
- Immediate mental health evaluation when clients enter the program. Many dual diagnoses in the area.
- Clients also have a 10 PM curfew every night in phase 1, then 12 AM in phase 2, and no curfew in phases 3 and 4.
- Strong focus on employment and structure in last two phases.
- Clients are required to obtain a sponsor and attend three self-help groups a week in phases 1 and 2, then twice per week in phase 3 and once a week in phase 4. They thrive and look forward to having that support system. Al-anon is also great for families to attend.

Requirements:

- Over 18 years old
- Resident of Macoupin County
- Charged with a felony in Macoupin County
- Non-violent
- Admitting to drug dependency
- Willing to participate in treatment

o Goals:

- 5 years from now these individuals are not engaged in SUD.
- "Restore hope, lead recovery, and advance justice."

Other information:

- Anyone can come in and make a referral to drug court in Macoupin
 County could be a parent, client themselves, or friends.
- The longer clients are in treatment, the longer they can maintain abstinence.
- Recovery requires community and drug courts are part of that network of support.
- Graduations are very moving and are life changing.
- Graduates usually start restoring severed relationships soon after program completion.
- Susan Dunn: Desire for community to understand how this program works. It is a community building network where clients help each other with rides, housing, etc.

o Q&A:

- Q: How long has program been involved with system and what is the percentage of those who have graduated and have not been back in the court system?
 - A: In Macoupin County it started in 2011, in Greene in the last 2-3 years. MC has a 65% success rate. Some individuals withdraw because they realize the program is different than what they expected. In 2015 the numbers were low, then reached 12-15 pre-Covid and hit low 5-6 during Covid. Now back to 15-16 participants.
- Q: Working on post-drug court network. What is the buy in for community stakeholders? What's the community's integration?
 A: Community interest started in 2017-18. Just now being asked to be more involved, especially with individuals in phase 3 who are looking for employment. We can provide employers a release of information for just drug tests, which clients are willing to sign. Would love to build these relationships but they are lacking right now.
- Q: Criteria for eligibility if a resident of Macoupin County is charged in Montgomery County?
 - A: The defense attorney would have to request that the entire file is judicially transferred, so they whole case could be moved to MC county which is rare. If you get charged in a county that does not have a drug court, they may ask that the client is accepted in another county. It would be a condition of their probation to comply with drug court in that other county. Usually the prosecutor handles that.
- Q: Do you experience challenges of clients not being able to participate due to transportation issues?
 A: Yes, the biggest issues are housing and transportation. In Macoupin, there is public transit but in Greene transportation is huge issue.
