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### **Community topic: Southside Opioid Task Force Narcan Training**

**What is Naloxone:** Naloxone is a medication approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) **designed to rapidly reverse opioid overdose.**

**Naloxone injection** is in a class of medications called **opiate antagonists**. It works by blocking the effects of opiates to relieve dangerous symptoms caused by high levels of opiates in the blood

#### **What happens when someone is injected with Narcan?**

It works by **blocking the effects of the opioid in the brain**. This medication may not work as well to block the effects of certain types of opioids (mixed agonist/antagonists such as buprenorphine, pentazocine). With these types of opioids, blocking may be incomplete, or you may need a higher dose of naloxone.

**What is Narcan?** Narcan is a brand-name medication that's FDA-approved to treat known or possible opioid overdose in people of all ages. (Opioids are very strong pain medications.) An opioid overdose occurs when someone takes more opioids than their body can safely process.

**FACT: Narcan and Naloxone is the same thing**

**How does Narcan make you feel?**

These include body aches, a fever, sweating, runny nose, sneezing, goose bumps, yawning, weakness, shivering or trembling, nervousness, restlessness or irritability, diarrhea, nausea or vomiting, stomach cramps, fast heartbeat, and increased blood pressure.

**Important note:** The FDA has approved the **36-month shelf-life** after completing a comprehensive review of data which included all versions of NARCAN®. Since this study was conducted using all versions of NARCAN®, any product previously released with a 24-month shelf life can now be extended for an additional 12 months.

## Administering Nasal Naloxone (Narcan®)

  
**1** First, do rescue breathing – tilt the person's head back, remove anything that might be in their mouth, plug their nose with one hand, and blow air into their lungs through their mouth. Give two regular breaths and then one breath every 5 seconds.

  
**2** Pull yellow cap from needleless syringe and red/pink cap off naloxone.

  
**3** Attach the soft white piece (nasal atomizer) to the needleless syringe and draw naloxone capsule into barrel of syringe.

  
**4** Tilt the person's head back, insert the white cone into their nostril and spray approximately half the naloxone into each nostril.

**5** If the person isn't breathing, continue to perform rescue breathing until the naloxone takes effect.



**6** Wait for 3 minutes. If there is no change, give the person another dose of naloxone and continue to do rescue breathing.



### NOTES

- If there is still no change after the second dose, it could mean the opioids are exceptionally potent and require more naloxone. It could also mean it's been too long since their heart stopped, there are no opioids in their system, or that opioids aren't the primary cause of overdose.
- Naloxone has no psychoactive or adverse physical effects.
