 - i. How can we best describe the ROSC to others? How can we explain what the ROSC is in a way that engages the individual and shows why they are needed?
 - 1. Like to tell people they are a part of the ROSC whether they know it or not every service that touches people in our community
 - Depends on the audience. PLE need to be empowered to get their voices heard. Agency – research before and see how the ROSC fits in with their work and how they fit into ROSC. Find how you can benefit one another. Network of community agencies that work together to bring recovery to every area.
 - 3. Our communities are only as strong as our weakest links.
 - 4. ROSCs are coordinated networks of services and supports in the community. They are person-centered and individualized; and they build on strengths. There is a greater emphasis on recovery rather than treatment. Treatment is a bridge to recovery. ROSCs also form partnerships/relationships within the community.
