Opening

Project Coordinator Amanda Douglas opened the meeting and introduced Julie LaBuda.

Presentation: Julie LaBuda

Julie shared her personal recovery journey:

- She identified cocaine as her drug of choice, last used in 2014.
- In 2015, she experienced an opioid overdose. Narcan (naloxone) was administered to her via injection. She noted that she administered it without prior training.
- Two days later, a friend overdosed. Despite receiving multiple doses of Narcan (three total), the friend survived temporarily but later died from another overdose.
- This experience motivated Julie to seek **formal Narcan training**. She learned how opioids occupy brain receptors and how Narcan works to counteract their effects.
- Julie expressed strong support for Narcan distribution and emphasized the life-saving importance of access to this resource.

Questions/Comments

- Elizabeth Thien thanked Julie for sharing and mentioned she always carries two boxes of Narcan.
- Stella Jones expressed gratitude for Julie's transparency.

Presentation: Stephanie Rosales

Stephanie discussed her role in the Lake County Health Department Substance Abuse Program, which focuses on:

- 1. Empowerment
- 2. Education
- 3. Dispelling Myths & Destigmatizing Substance Use Disorder

She emphasized Narcan as a **harm reduction tool**, comparing it to condoms and seat belts, measures designed to reduce potential harm.

Key Points:

- Narcan is **safe**: it only works on opioids.
- Narcan is **not addictive**.
- Narcan provides an alternative to overdose deaths.
- The elderly may accidentally overdose by forgetting they have already taken their prescribed opioid dose.
- Children may unintentionally ingest opioids.
- The prevalence of fentanyl has increased the need for community-wide Narcan access.
- She considers it a **privilege** to distribute Narcan as part of rebuilding the community.

Questions/Comments

- **Stella Jones** asked: *Does Narcan have an expiration date?*
 - Answer: Yes. Narcan 4mg nasal spray manufactured on or after January 17,
 2024 has a 4-year shelf life. Products manufactured before that date have a 3-year shelf life.

Guest Share: Michael Askew, SAMHSA

- Expressed appreciation for attending the meeting.
- Shared that SAMHSA has a **toolkit** available on its website.
- Noted that over 93,000 people in the U.S. lost their lives to drug overdose in 2020.
- While some areas saw reduced funding, additional funding will be available to support **Narcan distribution**.
