Guest Speakers- Prevention First

Speaker- Haley Hopkins with Prevention First

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1. Haley provided a presentation to the council. The presentation shared information about the services, resources, and support available through Prevention First, as well as ways they can assist communities and organizations in strengthening prevention efforts. The council appreciated the opportunity to learn more about Prevention First and the resources they offer.
2. Leadership Center and its efforts to expand evidence-based practices in substance use disorder system-wide collaboration to integrate prevention across the continuum of care. Information was also shared about the training and educational support, technical assistance, resources, and tools available to communities and organizations.
3. The Opioid Learning and Response Collaborative, whose goal is to strengthen the capacity of providers and systems across Illinois that are responding to the opioid epidemic. The presentation highlighted available training and educational support, technical assistance, resources, and tools to assist communities and organizations in their prevention and response efforts.
4. She also discussed Reimagine Youth Development and Prevention First's partnership with the Illinois Department of Human Services – Office of Firearm Violence Prevention, in accordance with the Reimagine Public Safety Act (RPSA). Through this partnership, Prevention First works to support stronger and safer communities throughout Chicago and Greater Illinois. Support is provided through training, technical assistance and support, and resources aimed at strengthening communities and promoting positive youth development.
5. CSAC and its partnership with Prevention First. Together, they focus on advancing high-quality, culturally responsive, and equitable prevention efforts. CSAC works to enhance workforce training, improve data-sharing systems, and strengthen collaborative capacity to reduce substance misuse and address the root causes and risk factors affecting youth.
6. The CADC Training Program, a voluntary training opportunity for Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) staff. The program is designed for staff who wish to become more effective clinicians for their IDOC caseloads by gaining the knowledge and skills needed to perform their roles effectively.

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Action Items

- Continue outreach efforts to recruit new ROSC Council members and community partners.
- Follow up with potential stakeholders who have expressed interest in joining the council.
- Share Prevention First resources and training opportunities with council members and community partners.
- Explore opportunities for training, technical assistance, and educational support related to substance use and overdose prevention.
- Continue planning upcoming recovery-focused events and community activities.
- Identify and request donations and community support for upcoming ROSC events.
- Continue promoting ROSC programs, meetings, and events through social media and community outreach.
- Encourage council members to bring new ideas, resources, and partnerships that can strengthen recovery and prevention efforts in the community.
