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Director's Note

"I think a painting is more like the real world if it's made out of the real world."

—Robert Rauschenberg

The world has radically changed over the last year, and America is no different. The pandemic disrupted life as we knew it, forcing us into isolation, straining the social connections we once held so dear (and that are necessary for living within our communities), while bringing with it a sharpened focus on inequity, injustice, and economic instability, to name a few.

Enter *bobrauschenbergAMERICA*: a unique look at America through the collage style of visual artist Robert Rauschenberg. Playwright Charles L. Mee borrows from varied traditions and styles to craft a story that does not follow a linear plot but instead offers snapshots of moments in Americans' lives. Themes include love, death, sex, capitalism, violence, innovation, division, and the myth of Americana—all more acutely relevant now than before.

True to Rauschenberg's artwork, *bob* both reflects and interrogates the intersection of art, life, and freedom. While *bob* does not offer easy answers for the audience about what it means to be an American, it poses provocative questions (and feelings) for us to consider. Perhaps tonight's production will allow you to reflect on America in this current moment.

Personally, this has been an especially fulfilling project—the ability to create for the first time in a long time after such a long period of collective inertia. I believe I speak for all of us involved in this production when I say that it has been a welcomed opportunity to embody our craft once again, in real time and real space, collaborating with other people in the same room. Working on this project, with such a committed cast and crew, has made me feel less alone, more connected to others—and that is exactly what so many of us need right now. Hopefully that spirit of interconnectedness and joy is felt through your screen.
