

# Restorative Justice: International Perspectives December 6-19, 2019

#### **Program Description:**

This course will be an introduction to the global movement in restorative justice, focusing on its implementation in the United States and Brazil. Restorative justice is an approach to crime and misconduct that brings victims and offenders together in dialogue to identify the harm caused by the offense and how it can be repaired and how trust can be rebuilt. Restorative justice practices are used in criminal justice systems worldwide as well as in schools and communities. The course focuses on restorative applications and lessons from community, criminal, and educational systems within many global contexts beyond the United States and Brazil, including Canada, Great Britain, Rwanda, South Africa, Australia, Fiji and New Zealand.



We will explore how restorative justice has been implemented in the United States and Brazil, looking at the application and execution of restorative justice theory and practices in the judicial system, schools and civil society in the cities of Santa Cruz do Sul and Caxias do Sul. We will also explore how Brazilian history, context and rich culture have had an impact in the way we think of restorative justice.

## Instructor:

**Joao Salm** is Assistant Professor Criminal Justice at Governors State University in Chicago. He continues to be a member of the steering committee of the Centre for Restorative Justice at Simon Fraser University, in Vancouver, Canada. He is also involved in international cooperation between Canada, the United States and Brazil in the area of Restorative Justice. Since March 2017, Joao has worked as a consultant to the United Nations Peacebuiliding Fund in Guinea Bissau, Africa. Joao has also worked as a consultant for the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) in Fiji and the Solomon Islands, providing tailored technical support to public and non-profit organizations in the area of social and restorative justice. Since 2010, Joao has worked as a consultant to the Supreme Courts of the three main states in Brazil: Sao Paulo, Minas Gerais and Rio Grande do Sul. He has organized two of the main international symposiums on restorative justice in Brazil in 2010 and 2012.

## PRELIMINARY TRAVEL SCHEDULE

The following is the expected travel schedule for the restorative justice trip to Santa Cruz do Sul, Caxias do Sul, Gramado and Florianopolis.

UNISC will be our hosts and site for our short course with UNISC students/Faculty. UNISC will coordinate the placement of the students and each GSU's student will be placed with local host family. Local families will host the students for free. UNISC will also provide classroom space for our short course.

In Florianopolis, we will visit Father Wilson Groh, a Catholic priest and liberation theologist. He will educate us about his social justice work, based on Paolo Friere's *Pedagogy of the Oppressed.* We will tour Mont Serrat with Father Wilson, a favela which has been a role model of transformation to the rest of Brazil. We will spend time with the community leaders and also learn about their programs.

#### December 17 (Tue): Florianopolis

Sightseeing: Visit the many beaches of Florianopolis, the hippie and surfer's community of Lagoa da Conceicao.

Afternoon: Return to Porto Allegre

December 18-19 (Wed & Thu): Return flight to Chicago



#### **Program Costs:**

Cost: \$2,000\*

<u>Included</u>: Domestic flight, on-site transportation, cultural visits, accommodations, tour guides, some meals.

<u>Not included</u>: International Flight, tuition & fees, most meals, Yellow Fever & Typhoid vaccinations, tips & personal items.

**Note**: At UNISC, students will stay in homestays with host families. The other nights they will stay in shared hotel rooms which are split between males and females.

**International Flights:** Once program participants are confirmed, we will work on purchasing flights. Students will be informed of the flight itinerary that they are expected to purchase. Flights must be purchased by November 1. Flight costs typically range from \$1,200-1,500.

#### Application & \$500 Deposit Deadline: September 20, 2019 Other Payments Due:

October 15 - \$500 November 1 - \$1000 (Financial Aid & Study Abroad Scholarship can assist with this payment, if applicable)

**GSU Study Abroad Scholarship:** Typically awards between \$500-750 towards the program fee. <u>Deadlines</u>: September 15 or October 15

**Vaccinations**: None required to enter Brazil, however, GSU requires all participants to get the Typhoid and Yellow Fever vaccinations. Consult <u>www.cdc.gov</u> and your doctor about other vaccine recommendations such as Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B and Malaria.

**Passport**: Passport must be valid on the date of entry.
