### **The Lewis Manilow Common Ground Initiative**

On Saturday, September 14, the Nathan Manilow Sculpture Park hosted its annual benefit—Sculpture, Wine & Dine—attracting more than 300 guests who dined al fresco amidst the park's unparalleled collection, experienced artist meet-and-greets, golf-cart and self-guided tours of the park, and a speaking program with GSU and park leadership. The event brought in more than \$50,000 in new funds to support theNate and its programs.

Announced at the event, the newly established **Lewis Manilow Common Ground Initiative** - named after the park's founder, philanthropist, and University Park and Park Forest developer - will serve as a dedicated fund to support arts education for the community. The initiative will make it possible for additional

school children and youth groups to make regular visits to theNate and to learn from the experience.

“Governors State University is proud that our campus is an internationally recognized Sculpture Park. In fact, Lew Manilow invited sculptors to create artistic works here even before GSU was officially a university. We can think of no better way to honor Lew Manilow than to establish the Lewis Manilow Common Ground Initiative to unite our community through art—from Frankfort to Ford Heights to Millennium Park,” said GSU President Elaine P. Maimon.
