





# THE STORY OF A NEW COLLEGE

Graduate education has always been an important part of Governors State University (GovState). In GovState's early years, its academic programs consisted of the final two years of undergraduate programs, and master's degree programs. Professional doctoral degrees began in the early 2000's with the Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) program and were followed with additional professional doctoral degree programs (Doctor of Occupational Therapy, Doctor of Nursing Practice) and Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) programs. Most recently, the first Ph.D. program in Counselor Education and Supervision began in 2021. Administration of graduate programs at GovState was decentralized, occurring primarily within academic programs.

With growth in the number of GovState's graduate programs, and particularly in the number of doctoral programs, came an increased need for centralized administration of some graduate studies functions, support for graduate students and faculty, and advocacy for graduate studies at GovState. To meet these needs, a proposal for a new College of Graduate Studies was presented to and approved by the GovState Board of Trustees in June 2023. The new College of Graduate Studies was then approved by the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) in September 2023, and the new college began at GovState during the Fall 2023 semester. The administration of the College of Graduate Studies follows a hybrid model, where responsibility for much of the graduate education process (e.g., admission acceptance decisions, decisions related to acceptance into candidacy, supervision of graduate assistants, faculty academic advising, conferral of degrees) remains within academic units and administration of student records remains in the Registrar's office. The College of Graduate Studies promotes graduate education, upholds excellence in graduate studies, and addresses specific challenges of graduate student recruitment, graduate advising, and administration of graduate assistantships and graduate capstone products.


## **Constance Jones- Graduate Funding & Outreach Coordinator**

# **GOVSTATE GRADUATE PROGRAMS**

More than 50 graduate and post-baccalaureate programs and certificates are housed in GovState's four academic colleges:

- The College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) offers 13 master's degrees and 9 graduate certificates in humanities, fine arts, public administration, and science and technology disciplines. CAS graduate programs prepare students both for professions and further education, and play a leadership role in identification, investigation, and working toward solutions for current societal issues.
- The College of Business (COB) offers 4 master's degrees and 2 graduate certificates in disciplines including accounting, business analytics, and business administration. All programs are fully accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB).
- The College of Education and Human Development (CEHD) offers 5 master's degrees in education and psychology and counseling disciplines, a School Psychology Educational Specialist degree, doctoral degrees in Interdisciplinary Leadership and Counselor Education and Supervision, and 11 graduate certificates. Graduate programs in School Counseling, School Psychology, and Educational Administration (Principal Leadership at master's level and Superintendent in the Ed.D. for Interdisciplinary Leadership) are fully approved by the Illinois State Board of Education to offer related Illinois licenses.
- The College of Health and Human Services (CHHS) offers 7 master's degrees, 3 doctoral degrees (Doctor of Nursing Practice, Doctor of Occupational Therapy, and Doctor of Physical Therapy), and 3 graduate certificates. All programs provide extensive field experiences and exposure to, or participation in, research and service activities through a large network of hospitals, medical centers, ambulatory-care facilities, long-term care facilities, private practices, schools, and social services agencies in the northeast Illinois and northwest Indiana region.





## FINANCIAL RESOURCES FOR GRADUATE STUDENTS

The most common sources of financial aid for graduate students are federal student loans, graduate assistantships, and scholarships. GovState employs approximately 80 students through graduate assistantships during each of the Fall and Spring semesters, and approximately 60 students during the Summer term. Scholarships are available for graduate students through GovState's Scholarship Universe platform, which provides access to institutional and external scholarships. Students are matched with scholarships for which they are eligible based on questions that they answer on the platform.

## **New Graduate Funding and Outreach Coordinator hired!**

Constance Jones will oversee work related to funding graduate students, graduate programs, and the College of Graduate Studies; perform outreach to prospective and current graduate students, alumni, and potential employers including Graduate Advisory Board members; and oversee graduate student training and development including graduate student orientations, onboarding of graduate assistants, and professional development for graduate students.



### Writing assistance for graduate students

In collaboration with the Writing Across the Curriculum (WAC) program, "embedded" graduate Writing Fellows in graduate courses to work with students and faculty on improving graduate student writing.



## **New Programming**

- For graduate students: Three workshops focusing on mental health and wellbeing, and time and stress management
- For faculty and students:
  - Hosted guest speaker from UIC, Dr. Daniel Morales-Doyle; title of talk "Social Justice Science Issues: A Catalyst for Transformative Education"
  - Hosted Research Days panel presentation: "Perspectives on Project-Based Learning at Governors State University"



## **Graduate Advising**

- Preparing for increased centralization of supervision and evaluation of graduate advisors, which should result in increased availability and effectiveness of advising for students.
- Working with a Graduate Advising Assessment Team on creating and conducting the first assessment of graduate advising at GovState.



#### Graduate student recruitment

- In collaboration with Honors College, updated **GPATH** viewbook and application materials.
- Developing a Pre-Professional Advising website that will provide prospective graduate students with details on academic and additional preparation required for application to graduate or professional education, particularly for the health sciences and legal professions.



#### **Funding**

Grant proposal, titled "TDS: Transdisciplinary Teams Doing Convergent Work in Data Science," submitted to NSF's Innovations in Graduate Education program: In collaboration with a cross-disciplinary group of GovState faculty and administrators and with Northeastern Illinois University, proposed work is to offer a new graduate certificate in Data Science Applications, a transdisciplinary project-based learning approach to train master's degree STEM students to use data science methods to address real-world issues. Students will work together as a team with community stakeholders to make progress toward the solution of an environmental problem. As our initial project, we are planning to work with University Park community members to address the issue of high lead levels in drinking water.
